Creating Networks in Digital Cultural Heritage: Workshop on R&D Networking for Early-Stage Researchers

**Tallinn University
10–11 September 2026**

This free two-day workshop for early-career researchers focuses on research and development networking in the field of digital cultural heritage. The workshop addresses a key challenge for emerging scholars: how to build meaningful professional networks across disciplines, institutions, and sectors. It brings together expert lectures, workshop sessions, and discussions to explore how connections are formed and sustained within and beyond academia.

Participation

Participation is free of charge. Coffee and lunches on both days will be provided. Participation in the evening gathering on 10 September is optional, and participants are expected to cover their own food and drinks.

Participants will be invited to prepare a short informal presentation (approx. 5 minutes) reflecting on the following question: *What possibilities do you see for connecting your research with other research fields, business sectors, or communities?* This may include reflections on potential collaborations, applications, or future directions of your work. Presentations and feedback rounds will be held in workshops on the second day.

ECTS requirements (optional)

Participants who wish to receive **1 ECTS credit** are expected to:

- Actively participate in the full workshop programme.
- Deliver the short presentation described above.
- Submit a networking and collaboration plan (approx. 1,200–1,800 words) after the workshop. Building on the workshop discussions and feedback, the plan should identify potential connections and collaborators relevant to the participant's research, explore one or two concrete possibilities for collaboration, and outline realistic next steps for the following 6–12 months. Participants are also encouraged to identify relevant funding, mobility, training, or networking opportunities that could help develop these connections.
